#### PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE FOR MARCH

Rotary Supports Education at All Levels

As Rotarians we are all proud of the service and philanthropy which makes a difference in our community and across the world. Polio Plus is our largest and proudest international effort and we have our monthly local service projects. Education is one of Rotary's priorities. Our club supports local educational efforts from financial support and service to the Boys and Girls Club, to the five \$1,000 SDSU scholarships given to area students each year.

Among the avid spokespersons and supporters of our 'Scholar Dollars' which funds our 5 SDSU scholarships is Dr. Dan Carlson, himself a recipient of an Ely, MN Rotary Club scholarship as an undergraduate student.

My husband and I have a friend, Dr. Larry Arnn, President of Hillsdale College, who because of a Rotary International Fellowship to Oxford in 1977 is perhaps the world's expert on Winston Churchill. This farm boy from Arkansas is proud to tell anyone about the impact Rotary had on his education.

One of the newest Rotary Global Grant Scholars, Katie Duszenko was sponsored by the Vermillion Rotary Club. There are also Rotary Peace Scholarships which are fully funded academic fellowships at one of our peace centers:

- Duke University & University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill US
- International Christian University, Japan
- University of Bradford, UK
- University of Queensland, Australia
- Uppsala University, Sweden

Each year Rotary awards up to 50 master's fellowships to these institutions. The Rotary Foundation has spent about \$29 million on its Peace Centers in fields related to peace and conflict resolution and prevention. Programs last 15-24 months and require a practical internship. The average grant is about \$75,000 per fellow for the two-year program.
